4	<b>Give your views on the structure of the programme and sessions included:</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Topics selected are relevant and good. However, the entire programme could have been completed in 4 days with one breaking in the morning seminar and another break in afternoon session. Some of the topics are not really relevant for High Court judges as the matters relating to these subjects may not be in the HC's in relating in next decade.</li><li>2. Course design and course contents were good and beneficial to the participants.</li><li>3. Programme should not be more than 4 days; Sessions in winter should commence at 9.30 am; Topics are relevant to the probable litigation which arise in future due to globalization and development of technology.</li><li>4. They can be more judge centric. Bare Acts t be provided during sessions. Timing for sessions could have been better by reducing it for a lesser no of days.</li><li>5. Well conducted.</li><li>6.
